Analyse how the poet uses a physical image, the growing crack in a wall, to examine two characters' contrasting approaches to a growing problem.

In your answer you should:

- identify and give examples of techniques used in the text, and explain their effects (techniques might include metaphors, alliteration, word choice, and structure)
- show understanding of the narrator's situation and perspective
- show understanding of the poet's overall purpose.

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QUESTION THREE: FICTION

Refer to Text C, "The Daydreamer", on page 4 of the resource booklet to answer this question.

Analyse how the writer portrays the young narrator in this passage.

In your answer you should:

- identify and give examples of techniques used in the text, and explain their effects (techniques might include metaphors, use of dialogue, and narrative style)
- show understanding of the situation and the distinct personality that the writer is communicating
- show understanding of the writer's overall purpose.

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
