The focus of the conflict is a clash of beliefs between the Ivish Travellers and Baisildon Council in Britain about a 6 acre plot of land, on the outskirt of Essex, known as Dale Farm. The land, bought by a Traveller family in 2001 was previously an illegal scrapyerd and is situated on greenbelt land (reserve council land) which is illegal to build on by anyone. Feeling discriminated against affer constantly being densed planning permission, the Travellers went to court attempting appeal the enforcement notices and fight for their land. In 2005 inspectors found that structures on the site did breach numerous regulations. (and complaints) Due to this and the complaints made by 10001 villagers about the traveller "divty" 11 testyle, Basildon council bailifted the Site and attempted to exict 86 families from the land on October 19th 2011://

Tony Ball, leader of Basildon council believed this was the right desicion because an online poll found that 70% of the public agreed with the judicial action. Moreover as a councillor; it is his job to abide by the law and follow

Sheridan valves the sense of Commity at Dale Farm where people look after one another, bringing meals, encowaging children. This snapes her belief by making her want to do everything in her power to

ensure her family is looked after. This makes her perspective a cultival one. As a troweller herself, grown up in England and well educated, she can see where the council are hanging things over her head. The cares a lot about these people - people who are elderly and sick, and need electricity, "which the council was going to turn off, to operate breathing masks. She wants to do what is best for her people. "There is no ideal site" Factors that shape this conflict stem entirely from historical predjudice and the laws in place in Basildon. Traditionally Travellers have been seen as white trash. They are often verbally or physically abused, hotels and restaurants have refused to serve them and schools have denied entrance to Traveller children on basis of over-capacity or "in-appropriatenes." This leads to families distrusting the education system altogether when their children are bullied or they feel like if takes away from their valves, and so the ethnic group ends up largely uned cated. This predjuctice is only encouraged through constant denial of planning permission and negative media response which candy shoridan says "villity them: I-The other factor spaping the conflict would be

the laws in Britain which prohibit building structure USE ONLY on greenbelt | and and that don't require councils to provide land for Travelles specifically. Oreenbelt land was introduced to perserve some of Britains country side. These are therefore illegal to build on. A section of Dale form is situated on the metropolitan green belt surrounding Lordon the biggest in England. The traveller's presence has contaminated the landscape with rubbish and raw serverage, Leaving the council and locals angry. Len Cividly whose lawn tacks on to Dake Faran says "They're horrible neighborrs... I hope the Value of my house doesn't plummet thanks to them." This comment puches on not only how they break the law and it's effects but also a shows typical discrimination you find. It is also important to note that in 1970, the Caravans Site Act was introduced and required aunais to provide pitches for Travelling families to live on.
